
Last week's meeting

Transitional living facility for men looking to expand

Since it was started two years ago by Jeff Parham, Joshua House has served about 40 men who needed help overcoming addictions and turning away from criminal activity.

But as one of its directors, Taylor Hastings, explained to the club last week, the waiting list is long and the need for services is great. "We hope to expand very soon," Taylor said. "We have a full house all the time, and some on the waiting list."

Described as a Christ-centered transitional housing environment, Joshua House has a current capacity of eight. It has strict rules for residents and provides not just housing (the average stay is about a year) but also help in securing employment and referrals to various community resources such as AA.



Some residents work at the adjacent JP's Collision Center, but a number of other local employers have been open to hiring residents who might have a criminal record.



Some of the men are referred to Joshua House from the criminal court system. The facility is currently working to raise money by selling chances on a red 2009 GMC Sierra pickup truck. This is a joint fundraiser with Hope Haven, the local women's shelter.

Taylor acknowledged that "not everyone makes it."
Those who do are often sent away with a "boot gift" — money to help with their first month's rent or a security deposition on a house or apartment. The immediate goal is to open another house

this year although Taylor said, "We could open three or four more."
