
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Casco manages through pandemic

Three members of the management team at Harrisonville's Casco workshop spoke last week about different facets the organization's operations. CEO Robert Greenwood talked about managing through the COVID-19 pandemic and confirmed that the annual employee picnic will not be held this year. The event is typically held in September and has been hosted by the Harrisonville Rotary Club for many years. He also noted that the facility, formerly known as Casco Area Workshop, now goes simply by the name Casco. Part of its funding comes from a countywide property tax levy, currently set at \$.0458 per \$100 of assessed valuation.



While the pandemic "hit us hard," Robert said, "We have made it through extremely well." He credited his hardworking staff for pitching in to keep essential contracts current. Among the contracts are ones with USDA and the military.

In May, Casco started a three-phase process of returning employees to their jobs. "They're not all back yet," he said, "but we are going stronger now."

Employees come throughout the greater Cass County area. About 60 percent live at home; the remaining 40 percent live in residential or group homes.

R achel Schliem spoke next about the variety of jobs and programs at the facility. "We work with all kinds of disabled people, both physical and mental," she said. Casco offers many types of job skills such as packaging, housekeeping and sewing, and offers many

opportunities for workers to explore jobs in the larger community. Casco works with many partners, including local employers and agencies such as the Missouri Department of Mental Health and the Cass County University of Missouri Extension Office. Transportation is provided on two daily routes.

The third person to speak was Joe Barron, community resource staff member, who fired up Rotarians with remarks about why Casco exists, "We help anyone... anyone who comes to Casco," he said. His job, simply, is to "let people know we exist, the resources we have, and how to get in touch with us." Speaking about the stigma that disabled people often face, Joe said, "I know what it feels like to be pushed aside. People that get back on their course after falling off...they do that because of the foundation provided by organizations like Casco."

History will be made when first woman leads Rotary in 2022-23

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a

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groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organizations 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on Oct. 1 if no other

candidates challenge her.

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement.

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce.

She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queens Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) degree.

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI vice president, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts.

She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.
